Testing Capacity	
Low positivity rate	2.9%
Health Care System Capacity	
Sufficient health care capacity without surge	81.4%
Contact Tracing	
Make first contact attempt for new positive cases within 1 day of notification	100%
Make first contact attempt for close contacts of new positive cases within 2 days of identification	95.3%
Percent of positive cases from quarantined contacts	2.9%

Beginning Monday, July 27, anyone coming into Washington, DC from a high-risk area who was not traveling for essential activities will be required to self-quarantine for 14 days.

The order **excludes Maryland and Virginia**. DC Health will publish a list of high-risk areas on coronavirus.dc.gov and update it every two weeks.

If people come into Washington, DC **from a high-risk area**

because they are **returning home** after performing an essential duty

because they are coming here in order to **perform an essential duty**

they should only leave home/where they are staying in order to perform essential activities.

High-risk areas are locations where the seven-day moving average of daily new COVID-19 cases is

10 or more per 100,000 people.

Today, we sent a letter to colleges and universities regarding their plans for reopening and further guidance around:

- Testing
- Contact Tracing
- Student Behavior
- Isolation and Quarantine

Students arriving from high-risk areas will be required to **self-quarantine for 14 days.**

For now, no additional arts and entertainment waivers will be issued.

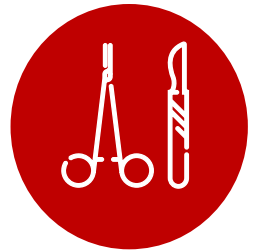
